Safeguarding St Helena's Community

he Safeguarding Children Board - committed to enhancing the safety and wellbeing of children and young people on St Helena - has awarded funding to no less than 35 initiatives on the Island which have an impact on safeguarding. Assistant Chief Secretary Paul McGinnety said:

"These schemes cover a range of diverse activities spanning all age groups, and it is very encouraging to see so much community interest, participation and enthusiasm."

The St Helena Junior Football League is just one initiative (in existence since 2007) that has been awarded funds under this scheme. The League caters for children from the age of five through to sixteen years, allowing beginners to enjoy the sport as well as older and more skilled footballers - with a mixture of boys and girls. The League has grown in popularity, with an initial signup of 70 children progressing to 90 children in 2015. One of the organisers, Nick Stevens, said:

"We have felt tremendous support from the community with the Junior League. At times we have over one hundred spectators supporting the kids, no matter the weather." Previously the Junior Football League has sought sponsorship from Sure and Solomon's for medals with organisers Colin Owen, Johnny Issac and Nick Stevens sourcing the remaining funds required. The new funding will allow the purchase of football kits and protective gear which is provided to some children unable



to buy kits themselves. Funds will also go towards the maintenance of nets, which suffer wear and tear during games.

The Salvation Army was also one of the successful applicants - wishing to re-launch the Mums and Toddlers Group, purchasing chairs and tables, plus safety gates to reduce the risk of children running outside. Lieutenant Carol Yon said: "Our Toddler Group is a chance for mums and toddlers to interact with each other in a social setting. The children get a chance to play, sing, dance and enjoy craft activities. Mums get the added bonus of chatting to each other."

The Salvation Army is also planning to start a Youth Club, where younger members of the community can visit the centre to simply 'hang out', in a comfortable and safe

environment, with snacks and drinks available. New Horizons was also successful for a bid to fund the next New Horizons Ascension Island visit. Nick Stevens spoke about the benefits of the trip, with those selected to travel often growing in confidence through being exposed to a different environment away from parents. In allows bonding with peers and participating in school and conservation activities on Ascension.
