Combined Building - August 2013



The structure of the Combined Building has been completed, and the Control Tower has now taken its final form with the installation of the cladding and windows. The brickwork is also complete and plastering is in progress. The installation of the services has started and erection of the roof is scheduled to commence from 6 October 2014.

The Terminal Building is also progressing well with the structure complete up to the first floor. The structure is currently 70 % complete and the roof receiving beams are due to be completed by the end of September 2014. Brickwork to the ground floor of the building is ongoing, and the installation of electrical, mechanical and plumbing works will start shortly .

On Saturday 27 and Sunday 28 September 2014, the public was able to attend Open Days at Dry Gut, Prosperous Bay Plain. One of the crucial elements of the Airport project - the Dry Gut fill - is now completed and the community was invited to view the tremendous progress, seen by peering over the edge and looking at the segmented sections. From 10am to 2pm on both days the public had options of socialising over refreshments and purchasing Basil Read souvenirs to mark the occasion. Visitors were also able to view a project progress to get a sense of 'then' and 'now'. Those who chose not to walk to the viewing points were offered shuttle bus tours around the Dry Gut fill, Airport Runway and Airport Buildings.

450,000 truckloads of material were used to fill Dry Gut.
