SUBJECT		Aerodrome Charges (Amendment) Regulations, 2018
		Memorandum by the Chairperson of the Economic Development Committee
ADVICE SOUGHT	1.	Council is asked to consider and approve the attached Aerodrome Charges (Amendment) Regulations 2018, to come into force on a date fixed by the Governor by notice in the Gazette.
BACKGROUND &		
CONSIDERATIONS	2.	Members will be aware that fees and charges should be reviewed on an annual basis as part of the budget process to determine whether they are appropriate and recovering the cost of service.
	3.	As a result of increasing pressure for upwards movements in expenditure budgets, it is necessary to increase revenue generation where possible and appropriate in order to maintain expenditure in other priority areas for SHG.
	4.	The Passenger Service Charge is payable when the passenger leaves the aerodrome (by air) for a place outside St Helena. The Passenger Service Charge is payable by all leaving the aerodrome including local residents and is incorporated within air fares. Based on Population Statistics between October and June the majority (70%) of departures were by people who were not St Helenian.
	5.	It is recommended that the Passenger Service Charge is changed from $\pounds 17$ to $\pounds 20$ for people over 12 and changed from $\pounds 8.50$ to $\pounds 10$ for people aged 2-12. It is recommended that the cost of The Passenger Service Charge for people less than 2 years of age is maintained at $\pounds 0$. This represents an increase of only 0.3% on a return ticket fare.
	6.	The date for the Regulations to come into force is to be on a date fixed by the Governor by notice in the Gazette. This is in order to allow for the IATA ticket system to be updated before the increase comes in to effect. This prevents a situation where the increase is in force but can't be collected.

OP	 EN AGENDA PUBLIC DOCUMENT 7. The Regulation also contains a provision so that tickets purchased before the increase are not effected even if they are for flights on dates after the increase is in effect.
FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS	8. Based on projected 4,000 people departing per year requiring to pay the Passenger Service Charge it is estimated that an additional £12,000 of revenue could be raised by approving the change to the Passenger Service Charge.
ECONOMIC IMPLICATIONS	 9. The proposal increases the benefits realised by SHG from investment in the air service and the associated tourism generated. 10. The price increase is very small (the price of a coffee) and will not have any effects on demand for the service. £3 represents an increase of only 0.3% on a return ticket fare. It does, however, generate revenue which can be used to co-fund important public services in St Helena.
CONSISTENCY WITH INVESTMENT POLICY PRINCIPLES	11. Not applicable.
PUBLIC / SOCIAL IMPACT	12. There will be a small increase for those people using the aerodrome of $\pounds 3$ per departure, whilst this $\pounds 3$ will be added to the ticket price it is considered to be a modest increase when considering the total cost of the ticket.
ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT	13. There are no environmental impacts identified.
PREVIOUS CONSULTATION / COMMITTEE INPUT	14. The changes were agreed with the Economic Development Committee on 5 th April 2018.
PUBLIC REACTION	15. There is likely to be some negative public reaction, but it will have to be explained as part of the overall need to balance the budget.
PUBLICITY	16. The decision should be mentioned in the ExCo Report and associated broadcast.
	17. The change in fees will also be published via the appropriate channels.
SUPPORT TO STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES	18. This paper supports all of the National Goals and strategic objectives as revenue generation is necessary in order to maintain expenditure in priority areas.
