Alison said:

"I love learning and teaching languages. Here on St Helena I wanted to introduce another language as we already have a French class on a Wednesday evening for those who started with me last year.

During the 10-week Spanish course, Alison covered the basics, including greetings and introductions, numbers, age, birthdays, family and time - plus asking and answering questions, which is vital in any language.

On completion of the course, participants were presented with a certificate of attendance (pictured) and went for a celebratory meal.

Alison added:

"For the Spanish class, they wanted to do a speaking test at the end of the course - rather than writing, reading or listening - and they all did very well. We had a good mix of students in the group and it was a pleasure to teach them."
