On Saturday 19 November 2016, a prize of £3,000 and the title *'St Helena's Tidiest District'* was presented to the winning district - Longwood & Alarm forest. There was also a second prize of £2,000 presented to St Paul's, and a third prize of £1,000 shared jointly by the remaining districts.

Marketing & Communications Manager for ESH, Chanelle Marais, said:

"Each and every district can be enormously proud of what they have achieved, not only in terms of the clean-up and beautifying projects, but also in terms of the strong community spirit that was shown by all. All of this was done by volunteers who committed their time and energy for the good of their community.

Today, we have announced one winning district, but the final result is that we have seven winning districts, and one victorious Island."

Schoolchildren Visit Landscape Mitigation Scheme

n Wednesday 19 October 2016, pupils from Harford Primary School joined staff from the Landscape & Ecology Mitigation Programme (LEMP), to learn more about the project and about conservation. The children planted endemic species, contributing to the restoration of land impacted by Airport construction.

The group learned about contributing to their environment as part of their Enrichment Programme, and were keen to find out what LEMP is and does.

Pupils visited sites alongside the new Access Road near Millennium Forest to dig holes, plant and mulch their own endemic Ebonies, Hair Grass and Gumwoods - and to learn more about the important work that LEMP is doing.

The children enjoyed getting their hands dirty and did not shy away from the hard work. One remarked that he wanted to work for LEMP when he is older. Primary School Teacher, April Stevens, said:

"All the children were excited to join the LEMP team in planting our Island's endemic plants. They wanted to know what LEMP meant, and were fascinated when told that LEMP is an organisation that looks after the land and plants affected by the Airport."
