

Donna Harris's Exposure Visit

HG's Safeguarding Directorate is committed to training and supporting the development of staff involved in services for children and families on St Helena, working closely with the Police Directorate, the Education Directorate, New Horizons, the Community Psychiatric Nurse, Ian Rummary and others.

In March of this year, Donna Harris, Social Care Worker, departed the Island to undergo an exposure visit in the UK for a month. The purpose of Donna's training was to enhance the services provided by Social Care Officers on St Helena and was funded by the FCO Diamond Jubilee programme.

Donna spent time at Birmingham Children's Services, at a centre which works closely with local families and children under the age of five, providing a wide range of support services. During her time there, Donna shadowed an experienced Social Worker and also visited the Lucy Faithfull Foundation in Alvechurch in Worcestershire, England.

Donna commented:

"Meeting the Lucy Faithfull Team was fascinating and, overall, the training illustrated that despite obvious differences, the work here on St Helena follows similar principles. In the UK there are specialists in certain areas of social work and specific roles for specific officers - whereas here on Island we are, by virtue of resources, generalists in all fields of social work, as a variety of cases can be referred to you."

In London, alongside her training, Donna also completed the 'Incredible Years Parenting Programme' and is

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currently working on how this scheme can be implemented here on St Helena.

Donna commented: "The 'Incredible Years Parenting Programme' is an American system, based around working closely



I am looking to adapt this programme, in terms of a social worker or carer working specifically with a family or individual on Island. Some of this is about people not worrying about sharing concerns with a group."

Samantha Dunn, Acting Service Manager in the Safeguarding Directorate, commented: "We hope now to start running parenting courses for those families in greatest need, once training materials arrive. We want to offer programs that are internationally recognised, with workers supported by professional training."

Donna explained how she felt the UK exposure has benefited her: "It has given me a specialism in the 'Incredible Years Parenting Programme' as I am the first member of staff to attend and complete this programme on St Helena. It will be my project and responsibility and I am looking forward to developing it and, I trust, that this will be of benefit to families here on St Helena."

Run Somewhere Different

he Festival of Running, a tourism event supported by NASAS (the National Amateur Sports Association of St Helena), will run from 8 - 15 July 2015 - attracting interest from local participants and international athletes alike. This must surely be one of the most far-flung an unique running event anywhere in the world.

The event includes a half marathon, a 3km race, a 10km fun-run, the Jacob's Ladder challenge, a 15km trail run and this year the first ever St Helena Triathlon.

Prizes and trophies will be awarded to the fastest participants but all runners will receive certificates to mark their completion of these most unusual running events. There is no restriction on entrants who wish to walk, jog or bring their pets along!

The minimum age for unaccompanied participants is 9 years, but those who are younger can take part so long as they are accompanied at all times by an adult.



Christine Stroud, Co-ordinator of the event, reports that the Triathlon in particular (organised by New Horizons) has sparked major interest. Ten teams have come forward to enter, plus a number of individual athletes. The Tourism Office hopes that this year will be even more successful than the last and anticipates continuing to hold this annual event.

'ST.ART' Programme

reative St Helena has teamed up with the Arts & Crafts Association to initiate a new project called 'ST.ART' - to actively support young Saint Artists in the creation of new work at the beginning of their careers - often leading up to an exhibition. The programme includes specialist workshops, one-on-one mentorship, group sessions, exposure to different types of art and online training. Art resources will be provided to all artists, including studio space. They also will receive support in selling their artwork.

Director of Creative St Helena, Pamela Murray, said: "We chose to set this up as an incubation space for artists at the beginning or early stages of their practice, aiming at 16-30 year olds, to encourage different types of art practice and offer practical support with art materials which can be expensive and hard to obtain. We will also be looking to move away from art as only 'a pretty picture' and try to be experimental and bold with what

we are trying to achieve, and to say, through art." Participation is free, but spaces are limited.

Chairperson of the Art & Crafts Association, Cathy Hopkins, commented:

"I am very excited about the ST.ART project as I'm sure there are quite a few young artists on St Art & Crafts Helena who do not realise their own potential."



Application forms can be collected from the Art & Crafts Centre at the Canister or from Pamela Murray at the Human Rights Office in Jamestown. Artists who wish to apply are required to write a short paragraph explaining the type of art they like to do and the reason why they would like to be involved in this new programme. Martin became interested in golf around ten years ago when he was influenced by friends to try the sport, and has been playing golf three to four times a week as part of his preparation this year's games.






Commonwealth Team in Glasgow 2014
