### **OLDEST LIBRARY IN SOUTHERN HEMISPHERE GETS A MAKEOVER**

he Public Library in Jamestown is said to be the oldest library in the Southern Hemisphere, and was established on 11 October 1813 by Governor Colonel Mark Wikes.

Today, the Library, situated near the Court House, has developed to house a current stock of 15,000 books of various genres, DVDs, audio tapes and magazines suited to both children and adults alike, along with a new upgraded electronic system, allowing the Library to introduce membership cards and books with bar codes that can be scanned.

To get to its current state, the Library recently underwent a period of restoration works to make it more customer friendly.





The Library re-opened with a special ribbon-cutting ceremony on Wednesday, 22 November 2017.

Director of Education & Employment, Shirley Wahler, said:

"The re-opening ceremony was an opportunity for us to celebrate both the history of the St Helena Public Library and the exciting future that lies ahead. It was very exciting to see the new look of the Library and the new electronic library management system. ## PRINCE ANDREW SCHOOL HOSTS FIRST EVER ENTERPRISE DAY

rince Andrew School hosted their first ever 'Enterprise Day' on Thursday, 30 November 2017.

Organised by Advisory Teacher Business & ICT, Frazer Stone, this event was aimed at enhancing students' understanding of how business and enterprise concepts relate to different elements of their lives and studies while developing their communication and problemsolving skills. It also helped to promote teamwork and enterprising skills.

The all-day event began when students of Years Seven, Eight and Nine, were divided into groups and set their task for the day.

Year Seven was tasked with planning, designing and pitching an Eco-Home. Groups of students had to build a prototype Eco-Home and prepare a presentation displaying the cost of each item they had included to build the home and showcase the benefits of an Eco-Home compared to a conventional non-environmentally friendly design.


Year Eight was given the task of constructing a rollercoaster business model. The challenge was to mould the longest running roller coaster with a set budget, so that it made a profit. Students were given items with a cost and had to record their costings on a spreadsheet.

Year Nine was given a bridge building challenge. The aim was to build a bridge that could support most cars; materials used had an individual cost and groups were set a budget to design the most effective load baring bridge.

A prize presentation followed in the afternoon. Prizes were awarded by members of Enterprise St Helena for the winning teams in each year group which displayed the best work and most innovative idea.

The SHG Press Office was invited along to St Paul's Primary School on Friday, 24 November, to have a look at some of the work done by pupils over the week.

Below is an account of St Paul's Primary School's participation in Anti-Bullying Week organised collaboratively between School staff and led by Deputy Head, Sherell Thomas.

This year's theme, 'All Different -All Equal' aimed to empower children and encourage them to celebrate what makes them and others unique, and to help children understand how important it is to make everyone feel valued and included, and able to be themselves, without fear of bullying.

The week, held between 21 and 24 November 2017, began with an inspiring Anti-Bullying Assembly. All staff and pupils joined in 'Odd Socks Day' where everyone wore two different socks to show that although we are different we all are equal. Throughout the week the school hosted various activities related to anti-bullying each day in class. Activities included: children creating a golden scroll with their picture for their class to write a kind message and placing 'stop bullying' trees in classrooms for pupils to share ways to end bullying. An assembly was also presented by the Police Directorate focusing on Cyber Bullying plus various types of other bullying.

The school hall, classrooms and the outside wallboards were finally decorated with the outcomes of the week, including posters and acrostic poems.

Headteacher, Mrs Patricia Williams, commented:

"I was very pleased and impressed at how the week developed with lots of activities going on. Pupils seemed very engaged and enjoyed each day. We hope the week will make them more aware of how we need to be treated equally and with respect no matter where we come from or what we look like, and understand the impact that bullying can have on individuals."
