SIR.

Your Excellency having been pleased to direct by Ordinance No. 1. of this year that a Census of the population should be taken, and that the Colonial Secretary should have the care of superintending the taking of the Census, and of preparing such Forms and Instructions as might be deemed necessary. I have now the honor to submit the results which are embodied in the seven returns annexed hereto.

In the preliminary measures which were adopted to secure accuracy and completeness the Island was divided into twenty districts (seven in Town and thirteen in the Country) and the service of a careful and active Enumerator was secured for each district. The Commanding Officers of the several Garrison corps undertaking to furnish returns of the Military, and the Collector of Customs procuring those from the shipping in Port on the 7th April.

On the return of the Schedules 1078 in number exclusive of the Garrison and Shipping a list of the whole in detail was drawn up with much care and transcribed in a Volume by Mr Knipe, Superintendent of James Town whose useful assistance in this undertaking has already been recognized by your Excellency.

From these Returns it will be seen that the total population is as follows:

this would shew an increase of 727 in the number of the Inhabitants since the census of 1851, and although from the imperfect mode adopted on that occasion the comparison

cannot be wholly relied on, there is reason to believe from the best Estimates which can be made that the increase is real as well as apparent.

About six years ago in consequence of glowing description of the advantages to be gained by emigration to New Zealand operating together with a temporary dullness in the local demand for labor, many of the laboring class were induced to seek an opportunity of proceeding to that Colony, but found themselves unable to accomplish their purpose: this desire for emigration led to an effort on the part of some gentlemen at the Cape of Good Hope to provide the means of passage for such of the Inhabitants as were willing to choose that destination, and a vessel under the management of a special agent was chartered with this object.

But when thus tested not more than 75 Emigrants were obtained. Since that period the demand for labor in the Island has greatly increased and wages to artificers and laborers have advanced at least 50 and in some instances more than 100 per cent.

Subsequent to the introduction of Liberated African Settlers which took place in the ten years prior to 1851 to the extent of about 550 in number the Island has received no additional Immigrants of that class excepting an occasional individual. Up to the present date the original number of Africans has been reduced by deaths and emigration to 320 and increased by 322 births shewing a total remaining of 652 of this class of the population.

In consequence of the confined space in which most of the one roomed huts inhabited by the poor in James Town are crowded together it is difficult to give from the returns the exact number of houses it being almost impossible to decide whether many of these huts should be dignified by the description of a separate house, or whether they should be considered merely as separate rooms of one general building.

As however the number of buildings remains almost precisely the same as when the general plan of properties was made some years ago by the Surveyor it will be sufficiently correct to state that the separate houses are 190 in

Town and 195 in the Country, the heads of families being 1078. Great need must therefore exist for better accommodation for the poor indeed every inhabitable house is fully occupied and the only nine uninhabited buildings are vacant in consequence of repairs.

Bearing in mind that the houses are most of them small these figures would shew a state of crowding which cannot be otherwise than highly injurious both to health and morals.

Against this it is satisfactory to find that the deaths during 1860 which is a fair average year did not exceed 155 (exclusive of Strangers) in a population of 6444 being at the rate of 2.4 per cent, also that the proportion of children receiving instruction at the Public Schools is very large being not less than 74.6 per cent exclusive of private pupils and the proportion of Native Criminals in Gaol is not only very small (one in a thousand) but the crimes are none of them of a heinous description.

The returns of accommodation and attendance at the places of Public worship although far from being as satisfactory as could be desired, will also bear favourable comparison. At home the return of sittings to the population shows a proportion of 57.0 per cent to 32.6 at St. Helena, but the proportion of the occupied to the whole number of sittings are 73.8 for St. Helena to 35.6 in England and Wales.
