What's available to help you prepare for higher education?

Consider Access to Higher Education Diplomas, A level courses and OU Badged Courses to help you prepare for university study or build your knowledge and skills in a specific area.

Getting ready for higher education

If you are interested in university studies but aren't sure if you're ready, there are opportunities for your to prepare at SHCC. Consider the options below as you plan your future.

Access to Higher Education Diploma

Accredited at Level 3 (Equivalent to up to 3 A levels) 60 credits – Most can be completed in one year

The Access to Higher Education (HE) Diploma is a qualification designed for mature applicants that prepares students for study at degree level. If you would like to go to university but left school without the qualifications you need, then an Access to HE course could be for you. There is no upper-age limit for Access to HE courses, and many don't have any formal entry requirements. SHCC requires 3 years of work experience for Access to HE candidates. These courses are offered through online distance learning.

A Levels

Accredited at Level 3 Require one to two years, depending on preparation

A levels are subject-based qualifications that can lead to university, further study, training, or work. Unlike access courses, A levels usually have specific GCSE requirements for entry. For mature students without Level 3 qualifications, Access to HE courses may be more manageable than undertaking two or three A level courses. A level courses are offered through an online, distance learning platform. Students access their courses and tutor through the IT facilities at SHCC.

Open University Badged Courses

24 hours long, spread over 8 weeks; progress at your own pace No formal credit is awarded but learners earn a digital badge

Open University badged courses were developed in response to the needs of informal learners who are seeking access to study skills and to have their learning recognised. These online courses help build skills and confidence in preparation for higher education studies as well as building knowledge and skills in specific subject areas. SHCC strongly recommends specific Badged Courses for anyone who plans to start degree studies through the Open University. Learners access these courses through SHCC's IT facilities.
