

he Saint Helena National Trust officially opened their new Shade House and standing out area at the Millennium Forest on Saturday, 8 December.

The Shade House and standing out area, which was built under the BEST 2.0 small grant funded project 'Nurseries for Nature', was constructed to not only increase endemic plant production but also to produce healthier, stronger plants that are more likely to survive in the wild.

On the day, speeches were given by BEST Project Manager, Martina Peters, Dr Rebecca Cairns-Wicks and Quentin Cronk.

In his speech, Quentin reflected on the history, the international importance and the future of the Millennium Forest. Quentin said:

"In the late 1990s, Governor Smallman asked for suggestions for projects to celebrate the new millennium. Dr Rebecca Cairns-Wicks put forward the idea of a forest, and the idea resonated. Under the guidance of numerous









visionary islanders, the project began to take shape. It became reality on a wet winter day in 2000 when 600 brave souls, who shared the vision, turned out each to plant a tree. What might be called "the miracle of the crown wastes" began to take shape. Who would have believed that a forest could grow in such an unpromising spot? It showed what a community coming together could do."

Thanks were given to all involved, especially the BEST funders, Andy Pearce for the design of the shade house, volunteer Chris Barnicle and all Trust staff especially the Heritage team - Darren Williams, Richard John, Rob Benjamin and Christopher Thomas - who carried out the construction.

The Shade House and standing out area was opened by the President of the Saint Helena National Trust Council, Mrs Ethel Yon.

Guests were then given the opportunity to look around and enjoy refreshments.

MS THE WORLD VISITS ST HELENA

he largest privately owned residential vessel, 'MS The World', visited St Helena between 9 and 11 December 2018. At the time of her arrival, The World carried 77 passengers and 289 crew.

On her second evening, The World's band, the 'Fabulous Fossils', gave a musical performance at the Mule Yard in Jamestown. The band's performance was accompanied by the Island's local bands – Island Politics and The Big Easy.

The world departed at 8pm on 11 December bound for Cape Town with 76 passengers and 288 crew on-board.

The World, which was launched in 2002, is operated by ROW Management Ltd, who's headquarters are in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, United States.

HORSE POINT LANDFILL SITE IN 2018

aste Management Services staff have completed a number of works 'in house' at Horse Point Landfill Site during 2018 as part of their contribution towards ever improving waste management services.

The majority of works was completed using waste materials found on site, resulting in minimal expense against SHG's recurrent budget. This included:

New signage within the Public Recycling Facility for easier recycling/disposal of wastes (Picture 1,2 and 3).

The bulky waste cell beginning to be capped and profiled over, after which the next terrace for bulky waste disposal will commence on top of this waste (Picture 4).

A chain link fence added within the Public Recycling Facility to prevent blown litter spreading across the site and beyond (Picture 5).

Reusing waste tyres on site for landscaping purposes, demonstrating the value in recycling and promoting the circular economy (Picture 6).

Other works completed at the site included the installation of fencing and additional signage around the sewage pond, and directional signage installed throughout the site to guide the public to bulky waste, green waste, animal waste, old cars, asbestos cells and to the sewage pond.

Waste Management Services anticipates further works in the future which includes: repainting the masts and bases of the Mobile Ariel Netting System covering the active domestic waste cell (for weather protection and longevity) and reorganisation of the large building to accommodate some Government Garage vehicles for dry/secure storage.

Landfill Manager, Patrick Crowie, commented:

"Everyday we bury money within the site because most wastes have a value and their opportunity for reuse or recycling is not being seized!"
