

## Horse Point Landfill Site

The site includes a Public Recycling Facility where the public can drop off or pick up recyclable items including;

**glass, cans, plastics, scrap metal, wood, paint, motor and cooking oil, tyres, vehicle and household batteries, textiles and clothing, electrical appliances, furniture and cardboard.**



Horse Point Landfill Site is open to the public 24 hours a day - 7 days a week, including Public Holidays (for health and safety it is advisable not to use the site during the hours of darkness).

# RECYCLING ON ST HELENA

## Why Recycle?

Since the creation of domestic waste cells at Horse Point Landfill Site (HPLS) it has become clear that the quantity of waste generated on Island has risen at a rate much greater than originally predicted, resulting in a dramatic decrease in the projected lifespan of the waste cells from 20 years to now 12 years. There is, however, an opportunity to delay the capital expenditure required to develop a new site elsewhere on the island by at least 25 years by increasing the amount of recycling taking place.

Recycling more waste would reduce the rate at which HPLS is filling, which in turn would increase the life of the site. This would form a significant contribution to the 10 Year Plan's waste KPI; *5% increase in domestic waste cell life year on year.*

## How can I contribute?

Recycling bins are located across St Helena. These include Olympic Bins (designed for the 2012 Olympics in London) which facilitate glass, cans and plastic disposal for recycling.



## Glass

The vast majority of glass waste is from bottles. Glass can be crushed into two product streams; Cullet—a larger gravel sized material and Sand—a finer more adaptable product, both of which have on island uses.

Glass is voluntarily collected and recycled by CNSKB Trading, a private sector partner of Waste Management Services.

## Cans

Cans and tins are made from either steel or aluminium. They are a resource with value. One hundred tons of mixed cans were landfilled at HPLS in 2013.

Cans are voluntarily collected and recycled by CNSKB Trading (see above).

**Recycle your cans in blue wheelie bins or in the Public Recycling Facility at HPLS.**

## Plastic

There are several plastic waste streams on St Helena. The majority of these originate from plastic drinks bottles.

Plastic recycling on St Helena is new, developed through a UK Government (DEFRA) funded Marine Debris Project, focused on recycling plastic waste recovered from the ocean.

Plastic is recycled by SHAPE.

## Cardboard/Paper

Cardboard and paper are recycled into artisan products by SHAPE. Much of their material is sourced directly from the producer e.g. shredded paper.
