The vessel was built in 2015 and has a Gross Tonnage of 29666.



SHAPE CREATES PRODUCTS MADE FROM RECYCLED PLASTIC

HAPE (St Helena's Active Participation in Enterprise) has recently started to create products made from recycled plastic.

The plastic recycling is currently taking place at the SHAPE Recycling Centre, Donkey Plain, and is led by Plastic Recycling Trainer, Ernest Fritz, together with Recycling Operations/Project Manager, Tracey Stroud-Belgrove, and Assistant Recycling Trainers, Wilhelmina Fowler and Cheryl Knipe. All have been instrumental in training the disabled and vulnerable Trainees in bespoke craft production using this reclaimed, sustainable material.

This new initiative forms part of the project for sustainably managing plastic waste on St Helena to minimise marine debris, and is operated in partnership with St Helena Government's Marine Section, the Saint Helena National Trust and Waste Management Services. The project started in March 2018 and ended in June 2019 and was funded by DEFRA (Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs).

Ernest explains the process of recycling the plastic:

"The plastic items are collected and stored at the Recycling Centre. From here, they are sorted by the different types of plastics. The plastics are then placed into a liquid which removes any sticky labels. They are sorted into categories by colour and type and placed in separate boxes. Different plastic types have to be separated as they have different melting temperatures and properties. Each plastic object, in its original form, is put into the shredding machine which chops the plastic into smaller flakes. The shredded plastic is then labelled and stored in separate containers, categorised by the colour and type of plastic, ready for when they are to be used."

The team uses a number of machines to create products from the plastic flakes. Currently, the team uses the 'Extrusion Machine' which extrudes a line of plastic that is spun around a mould. The team also uses the 'Injection Machine' which heats the plastic flakes and injects it into a mould. So far the team have created products depicting Jonathan the tortoise, whale sharks and square coasters using this machine. The final machine used by the team is the 'Compression Machine'. This machine heats the plastic inside the oven and is slowly pressed into a mould with a carjack. So far the team have experimented with creating plastic bowls.

Ernest concluded:

"We are still very much in the trial period and experimenting with products that can be made with these machines which is why we welcome any suggestions or ideas for new products."

There are seven different types of plastic. Plastic that can be recycled can be identified by the 'chasing arrows' symbol with the number inside the arrows (see below).

Any plastic item that has the 'chasing arrows' symbol with numbers 1-5 inside such as toilet cleaner bottles, plastic medicine bottles, shampoo bottles, margarine tubs etc can be recycled and are suitable for recycling at the SHAPE Recycling Centre.

Warm temperatures and an abundance of activities for all ages saw the number of visitors over the weekend increase dramatically from last year.


