Data source: Immigration records

- Data collected at point of entry and departure by Immigration Officers, one record for every arrival/departure combination
- Variables include date of entry or departure, demographics (e.g. age, nationality, sex), purpose of visit
- Analysed by Statistics Office within two weeks of receipt
- Now publish 121 separate statistical series on arrivals and departures each month

Basic definition of purpose of arrival

Returning residents

Returning to their normal place of residence, including those returning from employment permanently, excluding those returning for employment or business

Leisure visits

Two groups: tourists, excluding St Helenians, and St Helenians visiting family and friends temporarily (VFR)


Business and employment

Short and long-term arrivals for work purposes, including people and their families of those employed by SHG on contract

Transit


Those for whom St Helena is not their final destination, including most yacht arrivals, and transfers between a ship and the airport

Arrivals to St Helena at record high following scheduled air service





Visitor arrivals very seasonal

Monthly arrivals to St Helena, all forms of transport




Leisure visitors have increased substantially with the scheduled air service







Recent non-Saint tourist arrivals at record highs (242 in Feb 2020)




Arrivals by air follow the seasonal pattern






Trends: arrivals for leisure purposes increasing steadily

Annual arrivals of leisure visitors, years after airport opens




Tourists arriving by air stay for a week, visiting Saints stay for a month or longer




No clear change in length of stay over time


Average nights stayed by departing visitors by air




Johannesburg vs Cape Town: non-Saint tourist arrivals




Most tourists are British or South African




Most tourists are 40+

Tourists prefer hotels/guest houses


