

There is no zero risk option for containing COVID-19

BRADLEYS

Bradley's might seem completely safe because arriving travellers are all in one location

The truth is, if one person at Bradleys has COVID-19, there is always a risk that other people in Bradleys could be exposed — even if everyone follows the rules.

Rules about social distancing do not eliminate every risk

Someone might touch a handrail that has been recently touched by someone else.

Bradleys residents also interact with staff during quarantine. Even though staff wear masks and gloves, there is still a risk that they could be exposed. Staff do not live at the camp and return home at the end of every shift.

The risks at Bradley's are difficult to eliminate

Locking residents in their rooms or forcing staff to live at the camp are not realistic solutions.



HOME QUARANTINE

Home quarantine might seem dangerous because arriving travellers are staying in many locations

If everyone follows the rules, there is very little risk that one person with COVID-19 will expose others in the community as any case in home quarantine would already be isolated.

Home quarantine reduces the contact an arriving traveller has with others

Someone in home quarantine can have their accommodation stocked with supplies they need in advance and any deliveries during quarantine would be left at a drop-off point identified by a Proper Officer

Home quarantine only presents a risk if someone breaks the rules

We can significantly reduce this risk by making arrivals aware of their requirements, putting in place 24 hour roaming security and charging large fines, and/or imprisonment, for people who break the rules.
