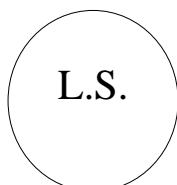

CURRENCY (ASCENSION) ORDINANCE, 2009

PROCLAMATION

In the Name of Her Majesty Elizabeth II, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and Her other Realms and Territories Queen, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith.

WHEREAS it is fitting that coins to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the birth of Napoleon Bonaparte, should be issued under the provisions of section 4(1) of the Currency (Ascension) Ordinance, 2009, which said coins shall be legal tender in Ascension.

AND WHEREAS it is within the province of the Governor to specify the denomination, weight, form and design and composition of coins to be made and issued, by Proclamation and with the approval of the Secretary of State.

NOW THEREFORE, I, the Governor of Ascension, acting in accordance with the provisions of section 4(2) of the Ordinance, and with the approval of the Secretary of State, do hereby order and specify for Ascension the following coins:

Design 1: Obverse impression: The Queen's Portrait side of the coins shall be dated 2021. The portrait is by renowned numismatic sculptor Jody Clark, and is referred to as the "Commonwealth Effigy"; it has been used on coinage since 2017.

Reverse impression: The central equestrian figures are the Duke of Wellington and Field Marshal Blücher, with Victory between them, guiding them to battle. They are in the Grecian style, similar to Pistrucci's earlier St George and the Dragon design for the sovereign coin. At the top of the reverse is Jupiter. Taking up the rest of the circumference of the medal are 19 figures of giants

whom Jupiter has struck down; they are the defeated enemy and number one for every year of the war.

Design 2:

Obverse impression: The Queen's Portrait side of the coins shall be dated 2021. The portrait is by renowned numismatic artist The Queen's Portrait side of the coins shall be dated 2021. Reverse impressions: The centre of the design depicts the four allied rulers: George, Prince Regent, Emperor Francis I of Austria, Tsar Alexander I of Russia and King Frederick William III of Prussia. At top of the design Apollo is seen in his chariot; he restores the day. Following the chariot are Zephyr, who scatters flowers, symbolic of peace, and Iris. The carriage flies in the sky towards Castor and Pollux, representing the constellation Gemini and symbolising the period of the Zodiac when Waterloo took place. The twins are armed with spears, and are meant as the apotheoses of the victorious generals, Wellington and Blücher.
