GIS Day recognised with Open Day at the Canister

he Geographic Information System (GIS) Section of the Treasury, Infrastructure and Sustainable Development Portfolio held an Open Day on Thursday, 18 November, to recognise GIS Day.

The Open Day was set up at the Tourist Office, the Canister, and included displays of map analysis, and an overview of GIS and how it can be used. Equipment, including both the GPS and total station technologies, were displayed for visitors to view and interact with.

Azra Gordy from SAERI spoke about the 'Move on' Project and GIS Manager, Devlin Yon, delivered presentations to primary school pupils which gave pupils an overview of GIS and how it can be used. Following the presentation, pupils were able to engage in activities relating to grid referencing and a test of their local knowledge.

In the afternoon, a video conference was set up with GIS sections from the Falklands, Turks &Caicos Islands and Montserrat. Each GIS Section from the Overseas Territories did a presentation showcasing how they use GIS and the different challenges each Island face. They also gave an insight as to what they did for their GIS days.

The day saw about 60 adults attend and about 60 to 70 children ages 6 to 11 years.

New Invertebrate Guide Book launched

he St Helena Nature Conservation Group and the Saint Helena National Trust (SHNT) launched their new 'Terrestrial and Freshwater Invertebrate of St Helena' guide book at the Museum of Saint Helena on Friday, 3 December 2021.

Present were members and staff from the organisations, invited guests, members of the public on St Helena, and virtual guests joining via Zoom, including Author Dr Roger Key, Deputy Director of the South Atlantic Environmental Research Institute (SAERI), Tara Pelembe, and Professor Helen Roy from the UK Centre for Ecology & Hydrology.

The event was opened by SHNT Director, Mike Jervois, who welcomed everyone and gave a brief introduction on those involved in the making of the book as well as the Trust's involvement. Mike then handed over to the authors of the book David Pryce, Liza Fowler and Roger Key, who delivered short presentations of their experiences.

During his presentation, Roger explained his connection to St Helena through Phillip and Myrtle Ashmole who had also been involved in nature research on the Island. Roger went on to explain the immense amounts of information and photographic data that was dealt with for the identification processes which he, David and Liza completed during the compiling of the book.

David and Liza both followed with their presentations of how they became involved. They both had been employed initially under the Darwin funded Project 'Bugs on the Brink' run by the SHNT. David compiled all invertebrate information on St Helena, whilst Liza coordinated the invertebrate education and outreach program. David

explained how working within the Perth Museum & Art Gallery in Scotland and Natural History Museum in London first brought St Helena to his attention. Liza stated that she had learned a lot from both David and Roger along the way and had enjoyed it immensely. Liza ended her presentation with a picture of her two young daughters playing with a butterfly and said: "these are our future and this is the book to educate and inspire all young people with".

The Terrestrial and Freshwater Invertebrates of St Helena book has over 1000 native and non-native species, classified and photographed within it. The book gives both common and scientific names, biological information on the species where possible, and locations of where they can be found.

This is the fifth book to a series of guides following the 'Flowering Plants and Ferns', 'Lichens, Mosses and Liverworts' and 'Marine Life of St Helena'.

Three Island Primary Schools hosts Advent Services

dvent is a season in the Christian year that begins before Christmas and ends on Christmas Eve.

Each year, in celebration of Advent, Primary Schools on the Island – Pilling, St Pauls and Harford – hold traditional Advent Services for the public to attend.

Pilling held their Advent Service at St James Church on Wednesday, 1 December 2021. The Advent Service was entitled 'Everyone loves a baby'. The storyline was about six children of a Bethlehem innkeeper who weren't so sure about babies – their newly-born brother was very noisy and a bit smelly, so the children headed off to see their friend who lives on the hillside, and along the way the children discover news of a special and unusual baby about to be born ... baby Jesus.

St Pauls held their Advent Service at St Pauls Cathedral on the evening of Thursday, 2 December 2021. The Advent Service was entitled 'Lights, Camel, Action 2! The Sequin'. The cast of nativity celebrated Jesus' birth with a dazzling dance show. The show is played out much like it does on the TV show 'Strictly come dancing', with contestants dancing to a box full of styles, from gospel to conga, and judges giving their witty and caustic feedback and scores. Rounding up the Primary School's Advent Services was Harford Primary School who held their Advent Service at St Matthews Church on Tuesday, 7 December 2021, at 7pm. The Advent Service was entitled 'The Right Shepherds' and the storyline was about the Archangel Gabriel and his choir of angels who were on a mission they were searching for some shepherds to tell them about the good news about a special birth in Bethlehem. he Dental Services on St Helena are provided from the Dental Clinic, situated within the Hospital setting in Upper Jamestown.

All routine treatments are provided (such as oral health screening, dental examinations, oral hygiene visits, fillings, extractions, root fillings, dentures, crowns and bridges), with the exception of implants and orthodontics, by a team made up of two full-time dentists, one full-time dental therapist, two qualified dental nurses and two trainee dental nurses.

There is also a dental laboratory on-site which is used for the construction of dentures (metal and acrylic), crowns, bridges, and other dental appliances and this is staffed by a qualified technician and one trainee technician.

The output of newly fabricated dentures from the Dental Lab has grown steadily over the last three years, so much so that the historically large list of patients waiting for new dentures has now been reduced by 80%. Furthermore, by removing this backlog of work, the technicians are now able to devote time to the reintroduction of crown and bridge production.

The Dental Service also benefits from the services of an Oral Surgeon who visits on an annual basis and who is available for advice at other times.

The Dental Service provide six-monthly visits to all primary schools on St Helena and an annual visit to Prince Andrew School for screening and dental health education purposes. This is followed up with appointments at the Clinic for those pupils/students requiring further treatment. In addition, the Dental Service have recently started a similar programme for pre-schoolers (six months to three year olds) prior to them commencing school to acclimatise and proactively provide preventive advice, where needed, to parents/guardians.

Through the expansion of their Community Dental Service, the Dental Service aims to reach out to members in the community who are having difficulty accessing the services by either visiting residential care facilities or through Community Health Care days, organised by the Community Nursing team.

The Dental Services' key objectives are to provide safe effective dental treatments while focusing on prevention

of dental disease and access for all members of the community.

As part of her Dental Hygiene appointments, Dental Therapist, Charmaine Buckley, goes back to basics and looks at how effective patients are brushing their teeth - this is an important step in reducing and preventing dental diseases (gum disease, periodontal disease and dental decay). To achieve this, Charmaine carries out a plaque test which provides a percentage of your oral hygiene status.

Charmaine commented:

"This has proven to be very informative and motivational to patients in their preventive dental care and I have seen such big improvements over the past year, to the extent where family members are competing against each other to lower their percentages – what better motivation can you ask for!"

In addition, the Dental Service runs dental health campaigns. The next campaign is the 'Flossuary Challenge'. During the month of February, the Dental Service will be encouraging everyone to clean between their teeth once a day for 28 consecutive days. The focus will be on 'why is cleaning between your teeth so important?' the answers: 1) helps prevent tooth loss, 2) reduces your risk of heart disease and stroke, and 3) reduces risk of diabetes.

Opening times

The Dental Clinic is open Monday – Friday 8.30am to 1pm and 1.30pm to 4pm split as follows:

- 8.30am 9.30am Emergency dental clinic walk-ins (on first come, first served basis)
- 8.30am 1pm Dentist/Dental Therapist clinics (appointment only)
- 1.30pm 4pm Dentist/Dental Therapist clinics (appointment only)

All appointments have to be booked with the Dental Reception, via the Hospital switchboard on tel: 22500. Likewise, the same number should be used for out of hours dental emergencies which would include pain, swelling, bleeding or dental trauma.

Pilling Primary School hosts war time choruses sing along

illing Primary School hosted a sing-along of War time choruses in their playground at 7pm on Thursday, 11 November, to commemorate Remembrance Day. HE Dr Philip Rushbrook and Mrs Rushbrook were also in attendance, along with parents and members of the public.

Head Teacher of Pilling Primary School, Elaine Benjamin, explained that the public has always requested an evening of this nature and Pilling have done several events in the past; some will remember the 'Night to Remember' hosted in the school yard by the Get-togethers Orchestra a few years back, with all contingencies on parade in the playground, and a later War time chorus evening, also with the Get-togethers Orchestra at the Half Tree Hollow Community Centre.

A large projector screen was hung from the School's balcony and provided lyrics for the crowd to sing-along and there was a large lit up poppy on the school balcony. The sing-a-long included old War time favourites such as Daisy, White Cliffs of Dover, We'll meet again, Lil Marlene amongst others. Pilling staff also sang 'Somewhere over the rainbow'. A special tribute song was played for all soldiers who lost their lives during the wars during which time, a group of teachers gracefully dropped flower petals from the top balcony as an act of remembrance.

St Helena Midwife, Rosemary Mittens, delivered a speech and spoke about the life of Florence Nightingale, particularly during her time caring for British soldiers fighting in the Crimean War. The Head Teacher then gave a brief history of Dame Vera Lyn (affectionately known by soldiers as 'The Forces' Sweetheart', who, during the war, entertained the soldiers through music. There were also poems and readings by staff, including the famous poem 'In Flanders Field'.

Head Teacher of Pilling Primary School, Elaine Benjamin, commented:

"Whilst attendance was somewhat disappointing, the sum of £92 was raised through a collection, and will be donated to the St Helena Veterans Association."



The Queens Baton Relay 2021/22























The Queen's Baton visited St Helena between Sunday, 5, and Monday, 6 December 2021. During this time, the Baton travelled around the Island along with an entourage comprising of CGA members, select local athletes, media and photographers/videographers. On Sunday the Baton was taken to Diana's Peak, Care Facilities and the General Hospital before making its way through Jamestown. On Monday the Baton visited all of the Island schools. At Prince Andrew School (PAS) students and staff lined the 400m sports track and passed the Baton around the entire circumference. The Baton was later relayed up Jacob's Ladder and then travelled to the Jamestown Wharf where a group of PAS students and

members of the Island swim team relayed the Baton to the SS Papanui. A reception at Plantation House concluded the Batons journey on St Helena.























Reception to celebrate Commonwealth Essay Competition Awardees

E Governor Dr Philip Rushbrook held a 'recital and awards' reception at Plantation House on Wednesday, 17 November 2021, to celebrate Commonwealth Essay Competition awardees.

The Queen's Commonwealth Essay Competition is the world's oldest schools writing competition, established in 1883. The Competition this year was based on the theme 'Community in the Commonwealth' and focused on children's experiences of the COVID-19 pandemic.

For the competition, in the Junior Category, children were given a choice of four options:

- 1. The year is 2050 and you've been asked to write about the coronavirus pandemic for a museum. What story would you tell?
- 2. Tell a story of how you, or someone you know, helped others during the pandemic.
- 3. 'We will be with our friends again. We will be with our families again. We will meet again' - HM Queen Elizabeth II. After the pandemic, you are seeing a friend for the first time. What new hobbies would you share with them?
- 4. What did you miss most during the pandemic?

During the reception, Portfolio Director of Education, Skills Gold Award: & Employment, Wendy Benjamin, gave a speech.

Wendy said:

"Given that the impact of COVID-19 on the daily lives of all living on St Helena was minimal, our children had to rely on the information from the news and through conversations as the majority of them did not experience this. I am proud to say that our children coped with this remarkably well and used their imagination. Some of them applied a metaphoric spin to their writing on this theme."

Shortly after, bronze, silver and gold awardees (listed below) from the three Island Primary Schools - Harford, Pilling and St Paul's - recited their stories and poems to the invited guests before receiving their certificates, presented by Governor Rushbrook.

This year a record breaking 25,645 young people from across the Commonwealth entered The Queen's Commonwealth Essay Competition.

Wendy concluded:

"The number of schools and children participating in this competition has grown again. For this year we have all

primary schools participating. I hope that next year we have entries from Prince Andrew School as well.

"There were over 25,645 entries from across the Commonwealth and for St Helena to achieve bronze, silver and gold awards is a great achievement! Well done to all teachers and pupils for your hard work and participation."
