Governor hosts reception for World Teachers' Day

World Teachers' Day (locally known as Teacher Appreciation Day) is held annually on 5 October to celebrate all teachers around the world. The theme for World Teachers' Day 2022 was *The transformation of education begins with teachers*'.

In recognition of World Teachers' Day, HE Governor Nigel Phillips CBE held a reception at Plantation House on the evening of Wednesday, 5 October 2022, for Teaching staff from the three Island Primary Schools - St Pauls, Pilling and Harford - and Secondary school - Prince Andrew as well as staff from the Education, Skills & Employment Portfolio.

In his remarks, Governor Phillips paid tribute to the tireless work and the extraordinary efforts of teachers and staff on St Helena, all of whom play a uniquely vital role in our community. Nelson Mandela famously said that "education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world". World Teachers' Day gives communities the opportunity to recognise and celebrate the work that teachers do across the world to transform education and the potential of their students.









The Governor said he was pleased to be able to mark the day at Plantation House alongside everyone who works hard to deliver education on St Helena.

Chief Minister and Minister for Education, Skills & Employment Portfolio, Julie Thomas, commented:

"I am extremely grateful to Governor Phillips and his wife Emma for hosting our teachers at Plantation to recognise and celebrate the integral role they play in our children's lives. St Helena Research Institute Introduces new way to record butterflies on St Helena

The St Helena Research Institute recently launched St Helena's Butterfly Monitoring Scheme (BMS), and with thanks to the UK Centre of Ecology and Hydrology, St Helena is the very first UK Overseas Territory to introduce the European Butterfly Monitoring Scheme.

"The BMS gives everyone the opportunity to record butterflies, at anytime and anywhere, using simple yet scientific methods, that will increase our knowledge about the islands butterfly populations", BEST Project Officer, Selene Gough, said. This can be done using the free app 'Butterfly Count' which can be downloaded at the Google Play Store or Apple Store.

Butterfly Count is an easy-to-use, specially developed app that records your track while you count butterflies for 15 minutes. As the time counts down you can take pictures and identify species. For each species, you can record the number of individuals seen, their life stage, and any comments.







Each time you add a new record, the app will save the coordinates of every individual.

"The more records, the more we can learn about St Helena's butterflies, like where and when different species are commonly seen and follow any patterns, for example in presence, that might appear over time", Selene added.
