

## A list of some of the words you may not be familiar with

<b>Dwelling</b>	The building in which people live. It could be a house or a flat. A dwelling may contain more than one household (see below).
<b>Dwelling Type</b>	A detached house or bungalow is a separate or free standing structure. Semi-detached and terraced houses share one or more walls with neighbouring houses.
<b>Economic Activity</b>	You are economically active if you are part of the available labour force for the island; typically, you will be working or looking for paid work. Economically inactive persons include those fully retired, studying full-time, or those unable or not wanting to work for any reason.
<b>Enumerator</b>	The person who gives you and collects the Household Expenditure form.
<b>Household</b>	A household is a person living alone, or a group of people usually (but not necessarily) related, living at the same address who maintain a common living area, sharing normal domestic tasks and expenses, including the purchase, cooking and eating of food.
<b>Household Members</b>	All persons living within the household if this is the place where they normally live, (e.g. if they spend 4 nights or more out of 7 at this address). If they regularly split their time between two dwellings then you should include them if you consider them a part of your household (see above).
<b>Marital Status</b>	Whether you are, for example, married, single, divorced, separated, or widowed.
<b>Owner-Occupied</b>	The property is owned, either outright or on loan, by someone who lives in that house.
<b>Relationship</b>	How you are related to another person in your household, for example husband, wife, partner, son, daughter, step-child, brother, sister, mother, father, grandparent, step-mother, step-father, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, grandchild, etc.
