






Night Work by Nora Roberts


The Governess by Wendy Holden

Miss Carter's War by Sheila Hancock






Deadly Cross by James Patterson

Detective Alex Cross knew both victims well, especially Kay who had been his patient once. And maybe more.



Sharpe's Assassin by Bernard Cornwell




The Missus by E L James




The Girl from the Island by Lorna Cook



The Rodchenkov Affair by Grigory Rodchenkov

In 2015, Russia's Anti-Doping Centre was suspended by the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) following revelations of an elaborate state-sponsored doping programme at the 2014 Sochi Winter Olympics. Involving a nearly undetectable steroid delivery system known as 'Duchesse cocktail', tampering and switching of urine samples, and a complex state-sanctioned cover-up, the programme was masterminded by Grigory Rodchenkov. The Rodchenkov Affair tells the full, unadulterated story that was first glimpsed in Bryan Fogel's award-winning documentary and



Experience by Martin Amis



Amis also reflects on the life and legacy of his cousin, Lucy Partington, who disappeared without trace in 1973 and was exhumed twenty years later from the basement of Frederick West, one of Britain's most prolific serial murderers.




The Vegetarian Cookbook by DK
