Land use development plan relating to Burnt Rock near Horse Pasture

We are writing to raise some serious concerns that we have about the proposed housing site at Burnt Rock near Horse Pasture. The major issues that have not been considered are as follows:-

Firstly, this is a forest area of natural beauty, both internally and externally, if you view it from the outside or if you are surrounded by it, there is an accepted beauty that should be preserved. It can be seen from almost half of the island and it is an important feature on the St Helena landscape.

Secondly, it is part of the history of this area of the island. When we were children we played in the area, our mums would take us there to watch the sun set. It is linked to the hearts of the people in the area and this in itself has a value, although not economic this cannot be overlooked.

Thirdly, this area has been used for Honey Bees for generations. Honey Bees are still farmed in the area and produce the majority of the honey on St Helena. This is a natural resource that is beneficial to the island and its people. Destruction of the forest for housing would put an end to the large proportion of honey production on the island. It will subsequently cause a substantial loss of income for all beekeepers in the area.

To sum destruction of this area for housing will mean erasing from the landscape a site of natural beauty that is part of the hearts of the people in the area; will mean the destruction of honeybee habitat and subsequent loss of income and culture for the people of the area.

Our suggestion for development of this area would be to plant trees to renovate the forest, which could be made to include a forest walk, next to the popular picnic site of Horse Pasture, to encourage people to appreciate the natural environment. Flowering trees would have the two-fold benefit of additionally beautifying the area as well as providing further nectar and pollen for the bee population.

Could you please let us know the outcome of this letter as soon as possible. We trust that you will seriously consider these concerns and rethink your plans for the future development of Burnt Rock.

Dear Sir

We are writing to express our concerns on the draft Land use Development Plan, it appears to allow development in fragile forest areas in particular Burnt Rock and High Hill zones.

Such forests have been in existence for many generations and to further develop them by a means of deforestation will have them adversely affected.

Soils will become exposed to the weather creating erosion, soils in the above areas are already of poor quality and once trees/forests are destroyed, it is unlikely that any other vegetation will grow in these areas due to the lack of nutrients in the soils.

Removal of forests will affect our livelihood. Our National objective of "providing sustainable economy through the use of Natural resources" will be defeated. The island will not be self-sufficient in supplying firewood and timber. Other livelihoods such as bee-keeping will also be affected.

We also wish to express that the land plan supports release of valuable land to Inward Investors, although we support inward investment we feel that development should be restricted to areas already developed. This is less likely to have an impact on the island's natural beauty.

We would like to see a plan which keeps forests protected due to their significant contribution to the economy and natural beauty. Construction of houses should be kept to less significant areas.

We hope that the concerns raised above will be given your careful consideration in this major decision making process for our island.
